

Whistleblowers Protection Laws under the False Claims Act

One of the best whistleblowers protection laws is the False Claims Act which prohibits retaliation and also pays whistleblower rewards for reporting fraud against the government. One reason whistleblowers do not step forward is they do not know about whistleblowers protection laws or how to use whistleblowers protection laws under the False Claims Act.

This article shows you how to find out more about whistleblowers protection laws, and in particular the anti-retaliation and reward provisions of the False Claims Act. This powerful whistleblower protection law applies if you face or suffer retaliation because you were considering blowing the whistle on your employer who was cheating or defrauding the government.

The False Claims Act Whistleblower Protection Law

If you are considering blowing the whistle on fraud against the government, the good news is that Congress enacted the False Claims Act law to do two things: (1) protect whistleblowers from retaliation, and (2) pay whistleblower a reward for courageously stepping forward and reporting fraud against the government. But you must carefully comply with exacting requirements to be eligible for whistleblower protection under the law or to receive a reward.

Before you become a whistleblower, you should learn what protections the False Claims Act (and other various whistleblower protection laws) offer. Under the False Claims Act, if an employer retaliates because you are considering reporting that your company is committing fraud against the federal government, the law protects you by requiring your employer to pay you double any lost wages and to reinstate you if fired. Many states have similar whistleblower protection laws for reporting fraud against the state. These whistleblower protection laws known as the False Claims Act also pays you a reward of between 15-25% based on the amount the government collects if your fraud against the government allegation is proven.

Hiring a whistleblower protection act attorney or lawyer

Because whistleblower protection laws are complex, you should hire an attorney or lawyer to evaluate your potential case and explain the law, before you blow the whistle. Most experienced attorneys/lawyers in this area work on a contingency basis, and can inform you of your chances of being eligible for whistleblower protection under the law before you make a decision, and can file your whistleblower reward application.
